History of the NDA

100th Anniversary of the Nordic Dermatology Association

With 59 registered members, the Nordic Dermatology Association (NDA) was founded at the first Nordic Dermatology Congress, held on 17–19 May 1910 in Copenhagen. The initiative had been taken by the dermatologists Kristian Grön from Norway, Carl Rasch from Denmark, and Edward Welander from Sweden when they met at the International Dermatology Congress in Berlin in 1904. The aim of the association, as expressed in its statutes, was to promote Nordic cooperation in scientific, educational and clinical aspects of dermatology and venereology, mainly by arranging congresses in the Nordic countries. Since then, 31 Nordic Dermatology Congresses (which from 2001 onwards have been called "Nordic Congresses of Dermatology and Venereology") have been held in Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden; 8, 6, 2, 7 and 8 times, respectively. Members of the Nordic national associations of dermatology and venereology (at present 1.424 individuals) become elected members of the NDA.

A further effort to promote Nordic cooperation in dermatology and venereology was taken by Lennart Juhlin in 1996, when he started the Forum for Nordic Dermato-Venereology. At the Nordic Congress of Dermatology and Venereology in Gothenburg Forum was appointed official journal of the NDA. It was also decided to recommend that congress organizers print congress books with meeting programmes and abstracts as supplements of Forum, thereby making them widely available, not only to congress participants. The printing of congress supplements is supported financially by the NDA.

Throughout the years the "Nordic meetings", held in spring or early summer every third or fourth year have been great events. In addition to high-quality scientific and educational programmes, delegates have been offered fantastic social pro grammes and opportunities to learn more about neighbouring countries. And, perhaps most importantly, the congresses have facilitated interaction between individuals, which is the basis of all successful collaborations.

In addition to scientific and professional issues related to dermatology and venereology, an item that was discussed for some time was the official language of the congresses. At the meeting in Bergen in 1998 it was decided by the general as sembly that at the next congress (Gothenburg, 2001) English should be used for all congress information, abstracts, slides shown in presentations, and posters. Also, that least one concurrent session throughout the meeting should be held in English. Furthermore, it was recommended that English should be used in as many other meeting activities as pos sible. Since the Gothenburg meeting the official language of the NDA has, in fact, been English. Among other benefits of this timely change, we have seen an increasing number of participants at our congresses from countries outside the Nordic area.

Another question that has been raised from time to time in recent years is whether or not there is still a place for (or even a need for) NDA and Nordic congresses in dermatology and venereology. Arguments have been put forward that an organization specifically addressing Nordic issues is becoming less important in these days of increasing coll laboration within the European setting. Furthermore, it has been said, there is an ever-increasing number of inter national meetings competing for attendees, organizers and calendar space. And, of course, there is also the European Academy of Dermatology and Venereology (EADV). Those who argue in favour of the continuation of regular Nordic meetings point to similarities among the Nordic countries in terms of healthcare systems, medical education, and therapeutic traditions. And, not least, they love to attend Nordic Congresses.

At every general assembly of the NDA at which the future of the organization and forthcoming meetings has been discussed, the majority of delegates have pronounced their support for continuation. One explanation for this outcome may be that the general assembly meets during an ongoing congress, which has so far always been a success, and that the attending delegates are already looking forward to the next Nordic Congress of Dermatology and Venereology. Only the future will tell; the next Congress is scheduled for 2012 in Finland. Exact dates and place will be announced in forthcoming issues of Forum for Nordic Dermato-Venereology.

§3 The purpose of NDA is to:

- promote the science and clinical practice of Dermatology and Venereology in the Nordic region.
- promote increased cooperation between the national societies of Dermatology and Venereology in Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden and between their members.
- support contact and cooperation with similar organizations in other countries.
- organize congresses, courses and other meetings in order to improve the basic and continuing education of dermatologists and venereologists.





Updates in Forum for Nordic D-V

Information from the Nordic Dermatology Association

The Nordic Dermatology Association's Resurgence

Shortly after the very successful 33rd Nordic Congress of Dermatology and Venereology in Trondheim, the Nordic Dermatology Association (NDA) celebrated its 106th birthday. Curiously, the NDA's anniversary is indeed a very special day for the Norwegians as well: May 17th, Norway's "nasjonaldag". Since the NDA's centennial 6 years ago, the synergies brought about by our Nordic alliance have been growing stronger than ever.

In Trondheim, the NDA members voted in favour of changing the association's bylaws. These newly approved bylaws have been thoroughly revised and entail several important modifications, which will surely lead to even better relations between the members of our national societies. In fact, the most important change in the bylaws was that, instead of having individual members, the NDA now has 5 member organizations. These members are of course the national societies of dermatology and venereology in Denmark (Dansk Dermatologisk Selskab), Finland (Suomen Ihotautilääkärivhdistys), Iceland (Félag íslenskra húðlækna), Norway (Norsk forening

for dermatologi og venerologi) and Sweden (Svenska Sällskapet för Dermatologi och Venereologi)

Another positive update is the increased number of members in the NDA Board, which now has 14 members with 3 representatives from Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden each as well as two representatives from Iceland. It is worth mentioning that the board members were nominated prior to the elections by the respective national societies in order to ensure a closer collaboration between the NDA and its member organizations. Season's Greetings From the NDA

At the end of September, the board members of the Nordic Dermatology Association (NDA) met up at the EADV Congress in Vienna. Our Treasurer Katarina Zak Stangeland confirmed that the NDA has a balanced economy with an appropriately sized capital buffer for future congresses and other activities. The second quarter showed a loss of approximately 58,000 SEK but we are awaiting a surplus from the Nordic Congress of Dermatology and Venereology (NCDV) in Trondheim of over 100,000 NOK. In regards to this, Kristin Ryggen and Petter Giersvik presented the results from the NCDV in Trondheim. which was also a great success in terms of organization, educational value, and networking. In total, 354 delegates were registered including 290 paying participants. Among these, 43 were nurses. Approximately 65% of the delegates were from Norway, but there were >40 delegates from Finland and Denmark, respectively, and >60 delegates from Sweden.



Our next NCDV will take place at the Clarion Hotel Post in Gothenburg, Sweden, on May casss of 8-10, 2019 and the planning for this has already begun. As the Congress President, I have

collaboration with the Swedish Society of Dermatology and Venereology (SSDV) to make this meeting a fantastic event for all our members in the Nordic dermatological societies. Several exciting names are already on the list of people who will work with me in the local organizing committee and the program committee including: Maria Bradley (Stockholm), Artur Schmidtchen (Lund), Charlotta Enerbäck (Linköping), Mihály Matura (Stockholm), Johan Dahlén Gyllencretutz (Skövde), Anna Josefsson (Örebro), Elisabet Nylander (Umeå) and Olle Larkö (Gothenburg). Our goal is to have a dedicated website for the congress up and running within the coming

Tove Agner, who is the chairman of the NDA's Education Committee, presented the successful results of both the 3rd Nordic Course on Skin Surgery and the 1st Nordic Dermoscopy Course, which have taken place during 2015-2016. The 1st Global Dermatology course, headed by Maria Bradley, took place in October and the outcome will be evaluated at our next meeting, Furthermore, Ellen Mooney from Hafnarfjordur, Iceland

and Ismini Vassilaki from Stockholm, Sweden proposed a new "Virtual Dermatopathology" course. The first course will take place in Iceland on April 27-28, 2017. Needless to say, we are very excited about the progress of these educational initiatives for all our members and are already seeing the positive effects of getting to know and sharing experiences with more and

We are also proud to announce that we now have a new Main Office for the NDA, which will be situated at Acta Der mato-venereologica's (ActaDV) headquarters in Uppsala and administered by Agneta Andersson, who also administers ActaDV and Forum for Nordic Dermato-Venereology as well as the SSDV Main Office. You may have already noticed that we have made some improvements and several updates to our website www.nordicdermatology.com, which is just the first step in improving our interaction with our members. Any feedback and suggestions from our members are more than welcome and can be sent to the NDA's new official e-mail address: info@nordicdermatology.com.

Finally, we received reports from our 5 member societies. The Norwegian Society for Dermatology and Venereology informed the board about the problems they are confronted with now that residents will be offered permanent positions at hospitals This system works in Sweden where the residents can be sent out to district hospitals if there are not enough positions at the larger University hospitals, but in Oslo, for example, this is not possible. This may result in an inability to recruit new residents, Furthermore, the Norwegian Medical Association is no longer in charge of establishing the criteria to be met by residents to become specialists. The government has taken over this role instead, which limits the Norwegian society's possibility of influencing the curriculum and requirements of the residency program. The Finnish Dermatological Society reported that the number of specialists in Finland is balanced The Finnish Dermatological Society also celebrated their 100th anniversary recently. The Danish Dermatological Society confirmed that they have a new President: Lone Skov. A new and more formalized process for recruiting residents is being put into use. The society is also working with an ambitious project of writing treatment guidelines for the most common and important dermatological conditions. The Swedish Society of Dermatology and Venereology announced that they have

NDA guidelines for course proposals

The intention of the NDA courses is to provide high quality courses of practical topics, not regularly covered by national organizers, and to support Nordic networking within Dermatology and Venereology.

Who can propose a course?

· Any member of the national dermatological societies that comprise the NDA. Pharmaceutical companies are not to be involved.

To whom the course proposals should be sent?

 Information should be sent to the NDA Main Office (info@nordicdermatology.com) from where it will be forwarded to the Educational Committee for assessment.

How many months before the event should a proposal be submitted?

A course proposal should be submitted at least nine months in advance.

What attachments are needed for course proposal?

 The course proposal form, budget, and program of the course with defined aims concerning the knowledge, skills and abilities that should be obtained during the course.

Who decides which courses are accepted?

. The Educational committee reviews the proposals and recommends courses to the NDA board which makes the final decision.

The economy of the courses

- First-time course organizers should submit a budget to the Educational Committee for approval. A guarantee sum from the NDA of up to 100,000 SEK is suggested for the first course in the rare case of a deficit following the course. The organizers are encouraged to repeat the course. Repeated courses should be self-funding. Any surplus goes to the organizers or organizing affailation.
- Number of participants should be around 50.

Payments of the organizers/teachers/lecturers

Speakers can be paid (1000 €), and travelling can be reimbursed.

Practical organization of the course

. It is recommended that a professional congress organizer is hired to take care of the practical arrangements.

To whom should the courses be directed?

The overwhelming majority of participants at the course should be from Nordic countries, and the title of the course should clearly indicate this
(ex: Nordic course on....).

How should the courses be evaluated?

 The course organizer collects evaluations from the participants and sends final a report containing summary of the feedback to the NDA office which forwards the evaluations to the Educational Committee.

Who informs the potential participants?

 The courses should be advertised by the NDA website, Forum for Nordic Dermatology and Venereology as well as the national dermatological societies. Professional organisers may contribute to the spreading of information.

How should repeated courses be arranged?

 The organizers should inform the Educational committee if they are interested in repeating the course, and a suggested date should be approved by the Educational Committee.


